A Right to your Beliefs – Faith or Non-Faith

It could be:

A belief in a value that guides their life.

A belief in the way you live your life (but with no reward in the afterlife.)

A belief in the way you live your life with your family (custom/traditions) and people around you.

A belief on making correct choices based on reason and logic.

A belief in nature and the world around them as a place to respect and be.


